Although we have had many good connections with one another working on the paths, slashing brambles, picking up litter or on the dawn chorus walk – this has been our quietest year – and probably our most frustrating.



The landslide has continued to disrupt our plans – with the destruction of the paths by the Council's contractors and their reluctance to restore them. We are not aware of any progress on their proposal to develop a detailed plan and estimate to resolve things. I'm not expecting any progress toward reopening the paths until 2016 at the earliest! Due to the state of the paths we declined to lead Heritage Days walks and we did considerably less balsam pulling than in past years.

Despite having been very pleased to welcome a couple of new faces, we have not been able to field the resources to follow through on our plans for 2014. The Council's apparent lack of interest in sorting out the problems arising from the landslide has been discouraging, and we are not quite to agile as we were! I think it is time to seriously consider where we are going as a group and what we can realistically achieve in this coming year.
